Reviewers' comments:

Reviewer 1: The paper presents an original contribution to the topic. There is a fascinating and intriguing argument emerging in this paper on 'the merging generic boundaries as the "Dream" slides in and out from one narrative mode [the essay] into another [the memoir].' Though there is large academic industry devoted to Rushdie, work on this specific topic of has been, as far as I am aware, negligible (with the exception of Wesley, duly acknowledged by the author). The paper is well structured and clearly argued, maintaining its focus admirably. The author presents and develops a consistent argument, with sections that are logically ordered and segue cleanly (History, Story-telling, Travel and Identity).

The abstract is manifestly short; it would benefit from including conclusions. Although I understand that the tone of the paper is free-floating and characterized by digression, it could benefit from a section entitled Conclusion (or similar) that would distinguish it in function from the section/keywords History, Story-telling, Travel and Identity. In fact, I feel the article is missing a more robust conclusion with a summary statement. The author covers much in the paper, travelling from History, Story-telling, and Travel to Identity, and could do a better job summarising the key points observed and this particular contribution to knowledge of the movement of auto-biographical text from essay to
